## NECROLOGY: PATRICIA WHITE

Word came to NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup> last month of the passing of Patricia White. Pat White was a graduate of the Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam and was a much loved and talented music educator (classroom music, chorus, music theory) in the Southern Cayuga School District from 1972-1996. Pat was also an early pioneer in developing computer-assisted music technology curriculum for the school music classroom. NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup> President Peter Brasch appointed Pat to serve on NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup> very first music technology committee back in the mid-1990s which subsequently led to her appointment as chairperson of NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup>s music technology committee. In addition, Pat also served as the music technology review editor for the NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup> School Music News magazine.

After retirement from teaching Pat contributed numerous articles to the NYSSMA\* magazine and led many technology workshops which educated and enabled music educators across our state to implement music technology in their school music programs.

In honoring her steadfast dedication to the music education profession, NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup> presented Pat White with its Distinguished Service Award at the 2011 NYSSMA<sup>\*</sup> Winter Conference held at Rochester, NY.

NYSSMA\* extends it condolences to Pat White's husband Dan and to the members of her family. Pat was truly an innovator and will be remembered for her wonderful contributions and commitment to our profession.
